

Summary

In this session, our mind is expanded as psychological and subjective arguments for the existence of God are given, relating to truth, morality, beauty, desire, and the human heart. Everyone desires complete happiness. Every natural innate human desire corresponds to something real, and complete happiness is attained through an authentic relationship with God. The human heart was designed for heaven, and our hearts move us towards God and heaven. Our hearts are bound to be broken if we give them to worldly things. If we give our hearts to God, we will never ultimately be left unfulfilled. Love is our most fundamental choice, and Christ desires us to love Him and others. To do so, we must have faith in the goodness of God, who is our Creator, Father, and friend.
